Greetings Neighbors,

I hope you are enjoying the summer! After the really cold and snowy winter, I gladly welcome the spring and summer, especially the events that come with it including I attended several graduations and recitals for my family members. ***Also, I am very proud of my talented 12 year old niece who is attending a summer session at the Dance Theatre of Harlem School.***

For our **2015** membership drive, we achieved a **62.88%** membership rate, which excludes the **19** vacant homes in our community. In **2014**, we achieved 72.54%, which excluded **11** vacant homes. This is a significant decrease in membership. I recognize that part of this decrease is due to block captains needed for several blocks/streets. ***See the Block Captain's Report in this newsletter, which shows our Block Captain needs!*** Your **\$10 (per household) annual dues** will continue to be used for community expenses such as BGE bills for entrance wall lights; maintenance of the entrance walls; neighborhood beautification projects including flowers and mulch for the entrance wall flower beds; refreshments for our community meetings; website fees; and printing newsletters. ***Your support is greatly appreciated!***



The Owings Mills Boulevard South, Phase II, which connects Winands Road to Liberty Road, is projected to be completed in 2015. As I am sure you have seen, Liberty Road is being widened at the Live Oak intersection to accommodate the traffic from this extension. Both of our entrance walls at Live Oak and Liberty Roads have been removed. I will be meeting soon with the Project Manager to discuss location of our new entrance walls.

A Gift To The Community

General Meeting (Pearl Kirby)

***Kings Park Association General Meeting
March 16, 2015
Hernwood Elementary School***

The meeting was called to order by President Keith Dyson at 7:12 pm.

President Dyson indicated that a guest speaker from BGE would be the opening speaker for the evening. Chanel B. Rhoads-Reed, Senior Community Relations Specialist Governmental Affairs Office. Ms. Rhoads-Reed stated that BGE Home was a separate entity from BGE. She stated that safety and service are priority for the company. The Governmental Affairs Office gives presentations on safety, environmental service, and energy efficiency. The office seeks to establish relationships with communities to inform them and conduct safety presentations. As an environmental friendly company, the company makes available annually an \$800,000 philanthropic foundation. They perform quick energy services to home owners.

Regarding electric choice, Ms. Rhoads-Reed said to be sure in choosing another supplier that the rate is not an introductory one that is used as a come on to obtain your business. She suggested that one be an informed customer by asking questions about the contract, automatic renewal, and early termination fees.

As part of community education, the Governmental Affairs Office, will conduct an educational program for children, a Bmore healthy program. They also focus on gas leaks, power outages, and carbon monoxide poisoning. The company will also wrap hot water tanks.

In conclusion Ms. Rhoads-Reed distributed business cards so that customers can contact her office for any of the aforementioned home services.

The second guest speaker was Officer Kristie Makowiecki of the Baltimore County Police Department. Her comments were to keep the neighborhood informed of crimes and crime prevention. She spoke of "deception burglary" wherein would be criminals present themselves as an employee of a company often with phony ID badges. Once entry is gained they may rob, perform shabby work, and steal other valuables.

Officer Kristie suggested calling 911, placing "NO SOLICITATION" in a highly visible place, and contact the Better Business Bureau to learn more about companies. She also stated there is no Baltimore County Code for door-to-door solicitations.

I. Reading of Minutes

The minutes were read by Recording Secretary Pearl Kirby and approved by the body present.

II. Financial Report

The financial report was given by Treasurer Gladys Winfrey. The report outlined funds spent to date and the current bank account balance. KPA funds were spent were for administrative items including bank fees, stamps, printer ink, envelopes, and BGE bills for the entrance walls. A total of \$90.00 was collected in dues, leaving a bank account balance of \$2,741.81 for January 2015. For February 2015, expenses totaled \$205.51, leaving a balance of \$2,646.30, with the additional collection of \$110.00 in dues.

III. Old Business**A. 2014 KPA Membership-Annie Butler**

There are a total of 539 homes on 23 streets in Kings Park Estates Community. There are 11 vacant homes. For the year 2014, 383 homes paid the annual dues, giving a 72.54% paid. The following six block captains had 100 % participation: **Annie Butler, Barbara Taylor, Sandy Thorington, Madolin Vassar, Ted Murray, and Pearl Kirby**. Only those households, who have paid dues will receive a copy of the Kings Park newsletter.

Dues are paid by the calendar year January through December. The membership drive takes place from April 1st- May 31st of each year. Mrs. Butler will distribute membership cards along with addresses and names for block captains. In addition, Mrs. Butler will email a summary of those dues that have been paid.

IV. New Business-Keith**A. Proposed Budget**

The proposed budget for 2015 was presented. There is an increase in administrative costs from \$750.00 to \$850.00 since we will not receive COP grant funds this year since insufficient COP members' activity (including patrols and meeting attendance), which is needed when applying for the grant BGE and Hospitality remained the same. Internet website increased from \$150.00 to \$250.00, due to enhanced features added to improve website functionality. . There was a reduction in Kings Park Improvement from \$1,600.00 to \$1,200.00 due to construction at the entrance at Live Oak and Liberty Road—will not have lawn service fees; Neighborhood outing was reduced from \$1,000.00 to \$500.00; printing from \$1,400.00 to \$1,300.00 for a total budget of \$5,000.00.

A motion was made and seconded to approve the 2015 budget for the Kings Park Association.

B. 2015 KPA Membership-Annie

Mrs. Butler reiterated that the 2015 membership drive is on. Block Captains will be asked to canvas their blocks to increase participation. Also dues will be accepted at the Community clean up date on April 25th and Document Shred day May 2nd.

By the end of 2014, only 40 households had paid dues for 2015. As of February 2015, an additional 21 residents had paid for a total of 61 paid households.

C. Citizens On Patrol (COP)- Malik Freeman

The COP is concerned about community safety, security, and property values. We want to maintain properties in this community so that those looking for houses will view Kings Park as a desirable neighborhood. Desirable communities generally receive better support for community services- schools, roads, etc. Vacant houses raise concerns for realtors and would be home owners.

Mr. Freeman stressed the need for additional patrol during after school hours. An analysis has shown that more burglaries, and property destruction take place during the dismissal of students. Late night vehicle theft, and car entry take place when keys are left, other valuables, purses, electronic devices-phones, iPads, laptops are left visible from the car.

We want to remind residents to **stop** at all stop signs. This pattern has been very noticeable with drivers particularly in the morning and after school. Drivers often do not come to a complete stop but a rolling stop and continue driving out of the development.

Targeted patrols are needed after school, early Sunday mornings, and holidays, and when there is early dismissal.

Residents are reminded that sidewalks must be shoveled with 24 hours after the snow ends. It is a county violation wherein residents can be fined.

The number of 911 calls made have been for infractions such as house alarms, motor bikes, loud music, mailbox destruction, failure to remove untagged cars from street.

D. Financial Audit (July 1, 2014-December 31, 2014) - Keith

All expenditures were accurately documented.

E. Document Shred Day-Keith

Document Shred Day will take place on May 2, 2015, from 10am- 12pm at the intersection of Marriottsville and Live Oak Roads. Residents must be in good standing to participate in this event.

F. Community Clean Up Day-Keith

The date for the Community Clean Up Day is April 25th, same location. Residents can go to the website for acceptable disposable household items.



Citizens On Patrol (C.O.P.) (Malik Freeman)

It has truly been an honor and privilege to serve as the Director of Citizens on Patrol (COP) for the Kings Park Community Association. I started in this position on January 1, 2015. My first objective was to implement the "Five Point Action Plan" listed below.

- Targeted Patrols - To deter and reduce criminal activity and code violations
- Children Safety - Improve the safety of children walking back and forth to school
- Electronic Reports – To streamline COP reporting requirements
- Improve Operations – Modernize training and equipment for COP members
- Membership Drive – Encourage residents to join COP

We are in constant communication with Baltimore County Police Department, our elected officials and other community associations to stay ready and relevant at all times. If you observe any suspicious activity and/or potential safety issues please report it to Baltimore County Police or Kings Park Community Association Board, including myself.

COP 2015 Violations Log Report:

As of June 28, 2015, COP has identified 21 violation cases and closed 17 of them. The 21 violations range from failure to remove snow, high grass, structural damage and untagged vehicles. I will continue following up on the open cases. I greatly appreciate everyone effort to take immediate corrective action on the violations identified. I am also thankful for the COP members and block captains who identify and report these issues.

Home Structural Damage:

We have observed some houses in our community with visible damage, including wear and tear on the roof, gutters, shutters, etc. This visible damage can have an adverse impact on the safety of the resident and the community. Additionally, the visible damage can degrade the quality of the community which ultimately lowers our property values. All 539 homes should be maintained with proper care and due diligence. If you see visible deficiencies and structural damage, we all see it. Please address those issues with due diligence.

Lawn Care/Maintenance:

As a result of the summer weather, vegetation and grass levels are starting to grow at expedited rates. I am pleased at the response of residence maintaining the appropriate levels of vegetation. Please continue to ensure that our community looks great.

Parking:

Please refrain from parking commercial trucks and tractor trailers (big rigs) in the community. Vehicles without current license plates parked on the street will be reported to the police as well. Also, vehicles on your property/driveway **must** have current license plates, per Baltimore County Code. Finally, please ensure you are adhering to the following **parking laws, per the motor vehicle laws**. First, the **passenger side of the vehicle must be next to curb**. Baltimore County Police have issued *warning* (parking) tickets in our community. Also, **when you park in a driveway, no part of the vehicle should block the public sidewalk**. It has been observed kids going to school and exercise walkers going into the street to get around the vehicle. *This is truly a safety hazard!* If you observe a resident not adhering to these parking laws, you can contact the non-emergency number for Baltimore County Police at 410-887-2222.

Safety Tips:

- * Keep vehicle doors locked
- * Keep trash cans out of the street after trash removal
- * Lock doors to homes
- * Joggers and/or walkers should wear reflective gear, when appropriate to avoid accidents. Our community has low levels of lighting. I would also encourage residents to walk with a partner as well.

COP Targeted Patrols OPERATION EAGLE EYE "If you see something, say something"

COP conducted "targeted patrols" on Saturday, April 18, 2015 from 9pm to 10pm and Saturday, May 23, 2015 from 7pm to 8:00pm. The purpose of the targeted patrols is to show a strong presence and deter criminal activity. COP members that participated in the targeted patrols include the following COP members: President Keith Dyson, Director of COP Malik Freeman, Greg Snowden, Darlene Connor and Rodney Thorington.

The targeted patrol included a static patrol at the intersection of Kings Point and Marriottsville Roads, roving patrol (vehicle) and foot patrols throughout the community. The targeted patrols have been successful. We plan to conduct another targeted patrol in July/August 2015 timeframe.

Baltimore County is Ranked #7 in Nation in 2015 Digital Counties Survey

Towson, MD For the fourth year in a row, Baltimore County is ranked among the top ten counties in the nation in terms of aligning technology initiatives with executive strategic priorities to provide vital cost savings and administrative efficiencies, according to the Center for Digital Government's 13th annual 2015 Digital Counties Survey in conjunction with the National Association of Counties (NACo).

"This award is considered one of the top measures of government technology performance and we are proud and delighted that we are, once again, rated among the best of the best throughout the country in terms of using technology to make government work smarter," said County Executive Kevin Kamenetz. "This award really spotlights the remarkable skill and dedication of our technology staff and our employees throughout County government as we work to enhance our efficiency and deliver excellent service and smart government to the people of Baltimore County."

Among the nation's counties that participated, Baltimore County's Office of Information Technology earned the 7th place ranking in the category for counties with 500,000 or more population. NACo and Digital Government leaders have emphasized that this award testifies to the success of counties' use of technology to serve citizens.

The County's high ranking was based on a number of factors, including these highlights:

- enhanced citizen engagement through responsive and intuitive design of the County's home page to help the website's 4.6 million annual visitors easily find what they need,
- active social media outreach that provides real-time information,
- the County's Operational Excellence initiative that fosters continuous improvement of business processes through technology,
- centralizing data to enhance security and functionality,
- providing technology platforms to improve field operations,
- coordination of technology assets between the County government and public library system, and
- development of the "One View" public school security and surveillance system.

The Digital Counties Survey is hosted by the Center for Digital Government, a national research and advisory institute on information technology policies and best practices in state and local government. This organization also provides government, education and industry leaders with decision support, research and educational services to help them effectively incorporate new technologies in the 21st century. This survey is conducted in partnership with the National Association of Counties (NACo), a full-service organization that provides legislative, research, technical, and public affairs assistance to county governments.

County Records 11 Criminal Homicides in First Half of 2015

July 10, 2015

Eleven people in Baltimore County died as a result of criminal homicides during the first half of 2015 - a continuation of a downward trend in the number of criminal homicides despite a rising population.

Seven of the 11 cases have been cleared by investigators so far.

Most of Baltimore County's violent crimes are targeted rather than random. Of the 11 criminal homicides that occurred from January 1 through June 30, 2015, five are cases in which the victim and suspect knew one another. In four cases, investigators believe it is possible that the suspect and victim knew each other. In two cases, there is no known relationship between the suspect and victim.

County Executive Kevin Kamenetz credited hard work on the part of detectives and officers for the recent success in driving down the number of homicides and in clearing these serious cases.

He noted that Baltimore County Police's good relationship with communities plays a significant role in this success. "Chief Jim Johnson and our officers and detectives understand that the trust of our communities is critical when it comes to fighting and solving crimes. It's the real key to public safety, and we will continue to cultivate it," Kamenetz said.

Virtually all types of crime have declined in recent years. Part I Crime - which includes the most serious types of violent and property crime - fell by more than 13 percent from 2006 through 2014. Most notably, Part I Violent Crime - homicide, rape, robbery and aggravated assault - fell by 29 percent.

Homicide Statistics

From 2010 through 2013 - during the watch of the Kamenetz administration - the number of homicides was lower (94) than during any continuous four-year period since the 1970s, when the County had 200,000 fewer people than today's population of 827,000. (The County recorded its highest four-year total for criminal homicides - 148 - during the mid-1990s.)

In 2014, 25 people died in Baltimore County as the result of criminal homicides.

Case Clearance

BCoPD's case clearance rates - a measure of how well a police agency solves crime - historically are well above the national average for all Part I violent crimes, including homicide. In 2013, for example, Baltimore County's case clearance rate was 100 percent, compared to a national average of 64.1 percent and a statewide average of 66 percent.


In 2013, the U.S. Department of Justice featured BCoPD in a 54-page publication on best practices for homicide clearance.

Note: The homicide information provided here may differ from official data gathered under the FBI's Uniform Crime Reporting System. The FBI's statistical program includes deaths that occur in previous years but are declared homicides in the current year. Also, the FBI may decide to include or omit certain deaths, such as the deaths of unborn children.


